Car Seat Safety 101
Picking a car seat that's right for your child is difficult, and

Picking a car seat that's right for your child is difficult, and correctly installing the seat in the car is even more challenging. Webster Fire Department is here to help to make sure your seat is properly installed, and your child is strapped in safely.

Two of the Webster firefighters have attended 40 hours of car seat safety training and know exactly how to adjust any car seat into any car. By making an appointment at the Webster Fire Department, they will not only put your car seat in correctly, but teach you how to do it yourself.

However, putting the car seat into the car is only half the battle.

Once your seat is properly installed, you must then make sure you also have your child strapped in safely. Use the correct harness slots and adjust the shoulder straps as your child grows. On rear-facing car seats, the shoulder straps should come through the car seat slots at or just blow your child's shoulders. On forward-facing seats, the shoulder straps should be at or just above the shoulders. After buckling the child in, make sure that the chest clip is on the chest, and not the belly. WFD then encourages parents to register their car seats on SaferCar.gov, in case of a recall or safety notice.

According to Safe Ride 4 Kids, anywhere from 72 to 84 percent of child restraints show critical misuses. Call Webster Fire Department at 281-316-3742 to set up a time for your car seat to be checked. Visit SaferCar.gov for more valuable tips on car seat safety.

Police Chief Danny Presley has received several thank you notes and compliments regarding Cargile's actions while on duty.



### Ordinance Reminders

**HEALTH AND SANITATION ORDINANCE**, once grass and weeds exceed 12 inches in height, it is a violation of the Ordinance. All properties must be mowed and maintained at all times.

**VEGETATION ORDINANCE**, once grass and weeds between sidewalks and curbs exceed 4 inches, it is a violation of the Ordinance. All properties must be edged and trimmed at all times. The ordinance requires tree limbs hanging over streets and sidewalks to be trimmed at all times so that they are at least 8 feet above the sidewalks and 14 feet above the street.

**SOLID WASTE ORDINANCE**, tree limbs must be cut into 5-foot lengths, not exceed 50 pounds, bundled and placed at the curbside. Republic Waste Services, the City's Sanitation provider, will pick up tree limbs at no cost if properly bundled by the curb. If not, contact Public Works Department for a cost estimate and removal. Cost is \$20 per half load and \$35 per full load. Contact Public Works Department at 281-316-3700 for further assistance.

Pick up days for trash and debris are Monday and Thursday. Thursday is heavy trash pick up day and recycling day. No hazardous items allowed for regular and heavy trash pickup services. Old refrigerators must be drained and doors removed.

**PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE**, all graffiti must be removed within ten days by the property owner. Fences must be maintained at all times.

# Make an impact. Donate to "On A Mission: Restoring Historic Mission Control"

"On a Mission: Restoring Historic Mission Control," is a \$5 million campaign to restore NASA's Historic Mission Control used during the Gemini, Apollo, and Shuttle eras.

In April, Webster City Council approved a \$3.5 million commitment as a lead gift to its longtime partner Space Center Houston to help fund the restoration. It is the largest philanthropic gift in the history of Space Center Houston. Although it is a significant achievement for the restoration efforts, another \$1.5 million remains to be raised to achieve the goal.

To motivate additional support, \$400,000 of Webster's gift is directed as a 1:1 challenge for a crowdfunding campaign to invite the public to help with the restoration and raise an additional \$400,000.

Since the City of Webster was incorporated in 1958, NASA has served as a catalyst to grow the City and the region. Webster is home to more than 2,200 businesses – many of which are aerospace companies working on NASA's current deep space missions and the daily operations of the International Space Station. The city's global importance to space exploration will continue through this campaign and restoration.

The community is encouraged to make a donation and become a part of the project which will provide exceptional learning opportunities that will attract people from around the world. Donations can be made by visiting spacecenter.org/on-a-mission.

#### MELVIN AND CONNIE DONEHUE

In 1965, when the City's population was under one thousand and Bay Area Boulevard was nothing but a dirt road that stretched only 10 feet wide, 38-year-old Melvin Donehue moved to Webster.

Now, at nearly 90 years old, Mel fondly remembers the last 52 years he spent with the City of Webster and the changes that have transpired.

"I came out here about July 6, 1965, and put in about 33 years as a city councilman, eight years as mayor pro-tem and about seven years as a volunteer fireman," he said.

The Apollo project brought Mel to Webster, but it was the medical center and the climate that got him to stay.

Originally from Ohio, at the age of 17 he went into the Academy, and the rest is history. Navy and served in the Philippines, where he realized that in some places, it didn't snow in the winter. When he returned to Ohio, he was cold, uncomfortable and weary of shoveling snow, so he said "to heck with it" and moved to Los Angeles for better weather and to further his education.

Before eventually relocating to Webster, he lived in Tucson, Arizona, Palmdale, California, and then Vandenberg, California. He began working on aircrafts as an electronic assembler before being promoted to electronic quality control, which was a position he held for around 30 years.

After accepting a job in Texas and moving to Webster for the Apollo project, he decided to explore city government and see what was going on in Webster. At the very first council meeting he attended, there were only four citizens from the public in attendance.

"I thought I'd become a councilmember, so in 1976, I first ran, and I won the election. Thirty-three years later, I left," he explained. "It was an experience I wouldn't change for the world."

While working on the shuttle missions and holding a position on council, Mel also joined the Webster's Volunteer

Fire Department for about seven years.

He was a busy man with a wife and four children, sadly in 1990 his wife, Barbara, passed away, and in 1991, he retired.

In 1992, Mel reconnected with an old friend, Connie. She was working at Academy when she ran into Mel. Two years later the couple got married.

Connie, a native Texan, originally moved to Webster in 1976 with her then husband and their daughter. She served as a member of the Celebration Committee and the Library Committee, but when she got a job with the post office, she was working six days a week and lost touch.

"I got divorced and moved away for a few years," Connie explained. "But I thought 'No, I want to be back in Webster, and so I moved back."

When she moved back, she accepted a position at

Now that the two are retired, they enjoy spending their time traveling, reading, exercising and spending time together. One of Mel's hobbies that Connie has taken an interest in is Native American weaponry.

Native American culture and the old western days have always piqued Mel's interest, he visited a local Native American goods store, and he believed he would be able to recreate the art and weaponry himself. So, he got the materials and did some research and has been creating shields since then.

According to Connie, his pieces are displayed all around their home, and she has learned to love the technique, as well.

Mel and Connie Donehue make up an important role in the history of Webster. Mel has made an impact on the City as a councilmember and citizen, and Connie would like the community to celebrate Mel at his surprise 90th Birthday Party. #### POLICE CHIEF DANNY PRESLEY

Police Chief Danny Presley has been around police since he was just four months old, and by the age of 5, he knew he wanted to be a police officer.

Chief Presley was born in Mount Pleasant, Texas and was raised in the Northeast Texas area. His father worked for the Longview Police Department, where the Chief discovered his enthusiasm for law enforcement.

After he had graduated from Sabine High School, he attended Kilgore College where he earned an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice. He then moved to Texarkana, Texas where he continued his law enforcement career.

After 24 years in Texarkana, Danny decided he needed a change, so he retired from as a Texarkana Police Captain and began his service with the City of Webster in April 2014.

Prior to moving to Webster, Chief Presley built up quite an impressive resume after serving as a dispatcher, patrol officer, public information officer, crime prevention officer, personnel and training manager, recruiter, field training program manager, and lead firearms instructor. He also served as an Operations Division Commander, SWAT Commander, and managed the Internal Affairs process.

He also taught Administration of Criminal Justice Agencies, Police-Community Relations, and Criminology at Texas A&M University-Texarkana.

Chief Presley gained city government experience when he served for two years in the Office of the City Manager as the City of Texarkana's City Government Liaison before becoming the Administrative Services Manager.

Presley holds a Bachelor's Degree in Behavioral Sciences from Texas A&M University, a Master's Degree in Business in Administration from Texas A&M University, and most recently, a Master's Degree in Criminal Justice Leadership from Sam Houston State University.

He is a Certified Public Manager and received the George C. Askew Award from the American Academy of Certified Public Managers.

He also holds a Certificate in Public Finance from Texas Tech University. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and was class president of the 254th session.

At the beginning of this year, Presley was selected along with 60 other leaders from around the nation to take part in the 2017 class of the Presidential Leadership Scholars Program. The executive leadership program was developed by President George H. W. Bush, President Clinton, and George W. Bush in conjunction with the Lyndon B. Johnson Library.

"I've gotten to meet the presidents, and I've learned a lot from them," explained Danny. "My project for the class is to help improve police/community relations."

Under Danny's leadership, the police department has remained a Texas Police Chief's Association "Recognized"



agency, maintaining compliance with the 168 Texas Law Enforcement Best Practices.

Recently, Danny oversaw a remodel of the communications center, which he thanks City Council and City Manager Wayne Sabo for.

He also helped rebrand the department and involved the officers in helping design a new badge, patch, and logo.

"They came up with three or four different designs, and we took a vote," he explained. "I'm very proud of the badge, patch, and logo."

The logo now includes the badge surrounded by the department's core values: honor, integrity, and service.

Chief Presley's current goals are for the department to increase community engagement and to continue improving the service given to residents.

"We have had a significant decrease in citizen complaints," said Danny proudly. "We have pushed toward better customer service and the way we carry out the job. So, I'm very proud of that."

Chief Presley currently resides in League City with his wife, Stephanie. They have four children Brandon, Haley, Lauren, and Kara.

Chief Presley enjoys traveling with his family, especially to the Ozark Mountains where he owns some property and hopes to retire when the time comes.

"I am so grateful to be here in Webster," Danny said. "Immediately it felt like I was at home and where I belong, and I have never doubted that for one day."

Police Chief Danny Presley is making a difference in the way Webster protects and serves its citizens, and we are proud to have his leadership in our City.
