SERGEANT RYAN SPAN

Captain John Vaughn has been with the Webster Police Department since 2006. He has served in many roles, including a K9 officer, for many years. In 2014, he was promoted to corporal, and in 2015 to the rank of sergeant.

During his time as sergeant, Captain Vaughn supervised each of the patrol shifts. In his new role, he will take command of the support services division.

"I am very proud of Captain Vaughn; he is going to do an outstanding job," Police Chief Pete Bacon said. "He is one of the future leaders in this

police department."

Sergeant Ryan Sprinkle was hired by the Webster Police Department in 2006. He started as a night shift patrol officer, and in 2007 he joined as a member of the traffic and crash division, where he had extensive accident and reconstruction training. After two years, he returned to patrol and, in 2018, was promoted to the rank of Corporal. As Sergeant, he will supervise a night shift.

"Sergeant Ryan Sprinkle has been a key member of our department training-wise," Chief Bacon told City Council. "He is a big influence in patrol. They look up to him literally and figuratively."

Corporal Michael Foran was hired by the Webster Police Department in 2016. He is a coordinator for the department's drone program, and he is a field training officer. He was promoted on January 15, and he will serve as Corporal on a day shift.

"This solidifies our command staff, and I am extremely happy," Chief Bacon said. "I am very proud of these officers and all of those who were promoted before."



Harris County Public Health Update: Vaccines

Check hcphtx.org and follow HCPH on social media for vaccine updates

Harris County Public Health is currently only providing vaccines for healthcare workers, people over the age of 65, and those with underlying health conditions (those who meet Phase 1A and 1B criteria) due to a limited vaccine supply.

Individuals who show up at HCPH locations and are not in Phase 1A and 1B will not receive the vaccine. The organization encourages everyone in Phase 1A and 1B to get vaccinated by reaching out to their healthcare provider/pharmacy as soon as supplies are available.
